DRAFT: South and East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership: UK Shared Prosperity Fund Consultation

Summary

The core objectives underpinning the consultation were to:

- Present details about the UK Shared Prosperity Fund together with the Partnership's thoughts about the sort of projects it is particularly interested in
- Gather ideas from stakeholders and residents about what they would like the money to be spent
 on and what they think will work best locally

The consultation took place between 13 and 30 June 2022. Feedback was still accepted during the week commencing 4 July to allow for responses being sent in via Freepost and additional meetings held.

The **consultation was widely promoted** with letters to stakeholders, social media posts and adverts in the local press. There was also a project website which hosted information about the proposal and a newsletter was produced which was emailed to stakeholders and also made available at community events.

People were invited to provide feedback via an **online survey** on the website, email, social media, Freepost or Freephone. Hard copy versions of the survey were available upon request. In addition, the website, adverts and newsletter included a sentence in Latvian, Polish, Russian and Portuguese stating that translated versions were available. Copies of the newsletter and survey were also sent to council offices and selected libraries to display.

The engagement included a series of online and face-to-face meetings with key stakeholders and a range of community events held at market stalls across the area.

Engagement and consultation with stakeholders

Key stakeholder letters

Letters about the forthcoming consultation were sent via email to the following groups of stakeholders:

- Sir John Hayes MP letter included details about the consultation together with an invitation for the MP to join the UKSPF Partnership Board relating to their constituency.
- South Holland District councillors
- Key delivery partners
- Proposed members of the South Holland Partnership Board
- Parish councils in South Holland
- Lincolnshire county councillors

A letter was also sent to a range of business organisations and businesses and included an invitation to an online meeting and a copy of the newsletter.

Following feedback from some councillors about it being difficult for them to attend day-time sessions due to work commitments, an email was sent to South Holland councillors on 22 June inviting them to an online evening meeting at 7.00 pm on 4 July.

Promoting the consultation

A website was developed with information about UKSPF and the consultation: www.selcp-haveyoursay.co.uk. Between 8 June and 7 July 2022, the site received 1,656 unique visitors.

- A four-page consultation newsletter was sent to stakeholders and was available at the community
 events. Copies were also sent to council offices and Spalding library to display.
- Half-page adverts about the consultation appeared in the Spalding Guardian and Spalding Voice during week commencing 20 June 2022.
- Consultation was promoted on Social media with Facebook posts in South Holland reaching 27,850 and Twitter posts reaching 4,358.
- A media release and image about the consultation was issued on 13 June 2022.

Meetings

A series of meetings with stakeholders were held about UKSPF and the consultation:

- South Holland District Council councillors online Monday 20 June
- South Holland District Council councillors face-to-face Tuesday 21 June

Results / findings of the public consultation

The key facts from the public consultation include:

• 756 people responded to the survey: this includes those who completed it online as well as those who completed a printed version or emailed a scanned copy of their response.

Community events

Hard copies of the survey were made available at the community events and the findings from these have been included in the survey results below. In addition, the project team also noted comments and ideas that people made on the day, which included the following:

Spalding market – 21 June

- "Used to be a thriving market now people have to bring own stalls/tables."
- "Parking not free leading to less footfall and lack of businesses"
- "Need better swimming pool facilities for children"
- "Spalding flower parade would like this back as it brought life into town and lots of people in"
- "Anti- social behaviour is a challenge nothing to do for children. Creating a space/park for children will combat this challenge and improve the town."
- "Everybody goes to Springfields and avoids town... the town needs more shops...current shops are not inclusive and do not suit all needs."

Long Sutton market – 24 June

- "Challenges with parking"
- "Create a youth club that teaches young people construction"

- "Tourist attraction like a mini railway that is maintained by young people"
- "Need a new park for children/young people with more slides and activities as the current park is not fun for children."

Key findings from the consultation survey

212 responses identified South Holland as the Council area and the main challenges identified were:

- 1. Open spaces for health and leisure
- 2. Town centre regeneration, particularly in Spalding
- 3. Lack of skills amongst the workforce
- 4. Too few facilities for the number of homes

Projects or initiatives that were identified

This was a free text question and an analysis of the responses was undertaken and a summary of the key themes and suggestions are shown in *Appendix A*.

Feedback via social media

Over 170 posts on social media in response to the consultation were captured. A selection of quotes for South Holland are included below:

- "How about investing in new good quality market stalls and letting the market traders know we are here for business! This would generate more footfall into the town and therefore companies to come and fill up the empty shops?! It would be a positive knock-on effect!"
- "Why not donate £100,000 towards the 2023 Flower parade..."
- "Totally revamp the South Holland centre the orange and white is dreadful, cheap and stark and
 the seats are too cramped and uncomfortable and make it a place people want to come for a
 drink, food, lunch as they did before and see the shows which actually are quite a good varied
 selection to come and see."
- "Use the money to employ a youth worker on a 3 year fixed term contract and provide them with resources and premises to start a long term youth program in the area. Bring in a contracted fundraiser to establish longevity and continue the project. Services provided could be wide ranging for young people."
- "Better public transport would help if you want to get people back in work."
- "A skate park for the town would be a great start, we have an active team already working on it, so why not just do it for the area and save us the time and effort of trying to raise the funds. It would certainly go down well."

Conclusion

A total of 756 individuals completed either the online survey, a hard copy of the survey or returned a scanned version of the survey to us via email.

Frequent suggestions via the survey were as follows:

- Provide funding for Moulton Park
- Invest in the market and businesses in Spalding town centre
- Enhance and tidy up Spalding town centre to attract new chain and independent businesses, restaurants, banks and residents.
