SUMMARY

This report provides an overview of the work undertaken by the Safer Lincolnshire Partnership at County level, the South & East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership at a local level, along with information on Anti-Social Behaviour activity in South Holland. The report recommends that the contents are noted, and additional areas of focus are considered for inclusion in future reports.

1. BACKGROUND

1.1 Community Safety Partnerships (CSPs) were established under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998. A CSP is required for each local government area, bringing the police, local authorities, fire and rescue, health, and probation to formulate strategies for the reduction of crime.

1.2 Locally, the South & East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership (SELCSP) is an informally merged partnership administered through the South and East Lincolnshire Council's Partnership (SELCP), covering Boston Borough, East Lindsey, and South Holland. At a county level, there is an informally merged countywide partnership known as the Safer Lincolnshire Partnership (SLP), administered by Lincolnshire County Council. Boston Borough Council currently discharges its statutory duties for reducing crime and disorder at a strategic level through the abovementioned partnerships and at an operational level by delivering services such as CCTV and ASB investigation and enforcement work.

1.3 The statutory duties of a CSP are as follows:

- 1.3.1** To prepare and implement a partnership plan that sets out a strategy for the reduction of reoffending, crime and disorder, combatting substance misuse, serious violence, community engagement and addressing the priorities identified in the strategic assessment.
- 1.3.2** To set up protocols and systems for information sharing.
- 1.3.3** To regularly engage and consult with the public about their community safety priorities and issues.
- 1.3.4** To commission domestic homicide reviews (DHRs) following notification from the police of a domestic homicide¹.
- 1.3.5** To hold one or more public meeting during the year.

1.4 This report will provide an overview of the work of the local SELCSP and the county SLP. The report also provides summary data in relation to enforcement action to address Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) including the alcohol-related Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) and Noxious Odours procedure.

2. SOUTH AND EAST LINCOLNSHIRE COMMUNITY SAFETY PARTNERSHIP

2.1 The SELCSP aims to combine knowledge, powers and expertise to reduce anti-social behaviour, crime and the fear of crime in South and East Lincolnshire, to ensure it remains one of the safest places to live, work and visit.

2.2 SELCSP is a partnership made up of the following organisations:

- South Holland District, East Lindsey District and Boston Borough Councils (officers and Elected Members)
- Lincolnshire County Council (Community Safety Team, Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership, and Public Health)
- Lincolnshire Police
- Lincolnshire Fire and Rescue
- Lincolnshire Partnership NHS Foundation Trust
- The Probation Service

¹ In February 2024 Government announced that DHRs will be renamed to Domestic Abuse Related Death Reviews following calls to better recognise deaths from domestic abuse related suicide. The changes will be brought into law via an amendment to the Victims and Prisoners Bill.

- Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner
- Wellbeing Lincs

2.3 Non-statutory agencies also contribute to the work of the partnership including housing associations, HMP North Sea Camp and the voluntary sector (e.g., Just Lincolnshire). The SELCSP works closely with the County SLP and supports its priorities.

2.4 The SELCSP has a Community Safety Strategy for 2022-2025 to demonstrate the work of partners at the sub-regional level. The partnership has a working action plan for each financial year that the strategy covers. A copy of the plan with updates for 2023-24 is included in Appendix A.

2.5 The identified priorities are presented below along with some key actions undertaken during the last year.

2.6 Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

2.6.1 Anti-Social Behaviour Awareness week – This is an annual campaign to highlight the work that partners do to tackle ASB. A countywide communications campaign took place during the week. The aims were to raise public awareness of:

- What constitutes ASB.
- The importance of reporting ASB, who to report to and how.
- The ASB Case Review (formerly Community Trigger) and how to make a request.
- The positive action in response to ASB in Lincolnshire and the partnership approach – using good news stories/quotes from victims etc.
- Messages were shared via social media by key agencies involved in tackling ASB.

2.6.2 Noxious Odour Process – Fumes from people smoking Cannabis can amount to ASB where the impact of the odour has a detrimental impact of a continuing nature on the quality of life of those in the locality. Following a pilot in Boston (from March to October 2023), the process has been rolled out countywide with the launch of the Lincolnshire Noxious Odour Procedures (Residential Premises) in November 2023.

2.7 Hate Crime

2.7.1 Hate Crime Awareness week – This is an annual campaign to raise awareness of what hate crimes are and how people can report them. A communications plan was delivered across the South and East Lincs Partnership area to increase awareness of what Hate Crime is, how it can be reported and the support available to victims. Victim Support are the new provider for Hate Crime support in Lincolnshire (formerly Stop Hate UK).

2.7.2 Increasing awareness and reporting of hate incidents – Lincolnshire Police are routinely providing data on Hate Crimes on a quarterly basis which will assist in monitoring the type of issues occurring within the districts. Lincolnshire Police have also produced a problem profile and will be consulting with districts as they develop a strategic plan to address Hate Crime and Hate Incidents.

2.8 The Safety of Women & Girls:

2.8.1 White Ribbon Day & 16 Days of Action – This is an annual campaign to end violence against women. White Ribbon Day marks the start of the 16 days of action against domestic violence. A substantial communications plan was produced and delivered by the Domestic Abuse Partnership and supported by partner organisations to maximise the effectiveness of the plan.

2.9 Vulnerability & Safeguarding

- 2.9.1 Fraud Awareness Raising – Support is provided to the county Crime & Disorder Fraud Core Priority Group (CPG) in achieving the overarching aim of tackling digitally enabled fraud & identity theft. The South & East Lincs Councils Partnership has helped to publicise campaigns such as the Crimestoppers ATM Distraction Theft and Government’s national ‘Stop! Think Fraud’ campaign.
- 2.9.2 Domestic Abuse Officers – Three officers have been introduced across the SELCP area to support staff in identifying and supporting individuals experiencing domestic abuse (DA), through the following:
- Supporting staff in completing a DASH risk assessment and advising on signposting a client or referring to MARAC
 - Attending MARAC
 - Training staff on DASH risk assessments
 - Overseeing target hardening / Sanctuary for DA cases
 - Working on DAHA accreditation which is a DA housing accreditation
 - Working on DA policies and procedures
 - Eventually training staff to be DA Champions

3. ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR ENFORCEMENT IN SOUTH HOLLAND

- 3.1 South Holland District Council’s Anti-Social Behaviour Officer and Community Warden work in partnership with Lincolnshire Police, Housing Associations, and other agencies to tackle ASB. Officers follow the guidance set out in the Countywide procedures for tackling ASB in Lincolnshire, which details the tools and powers brought in by the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014. - 3.2 An incremental approach is used to give advice and encourage people to stop the ASB before considering more formal (legal) methods. People are provided with support, guidance and signposting to other organisations who may be able to help, where applicable.
- 3.3 Information on enforcement action taken to tackle ASB in South Holland is included in Appendix B.
- 3.4 The team has seen an increase in the number of complex cases where the alleged perpetrators have challenges with misuse of drugs, alcohol and either diagnosed or undiagnosed challenges around mental health. South Holland District Council facilitate two multi agency meetings monthly.
- Anti-Social Behaviour Risk Assessment Conference – this meeting is multi agency and is in place to reduce risk for the cases of anti-social behaviour.
 - Vulnerable Adult Panel – this meeting is multi agency and is in place to problem solve cases where individuals are at risk of homeless and/or have drug and alcohol misuse that are impacting their ability to maintain a tenancy
- 3.5 The concern relating to an increase in anti-social behaviour cases with linked Mental Health concerns was raised at the Safer Lincolnshire Partnership Anti-Social Behaviour Core Priority Group. A Task and finish Group was created where it was agreed that improved communication between Community Safety Teams and Mental Health Services could be established. It was agreed that this would be reviewed to ensure there was a positive impact on resolving these types of cases.

4. SAFER LINCOLNSHIRE PARTNERSHIP (SLP)

- 4.1. South Holland District Council, East Lindsey District Council and Boston Borough Council are all statutory members of the SLP. They provide representation at the SLP Strategy Board and are committed to the delivery of the current SLP Strategic Priorities through participation at the underpinning Core Priority Groups.
- 4.2. SLP Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Annual Report
- 4.3. The AGM was held on 30th April 2024 and was open for the public to attend along with strategic representatives from across the partnership. The AGM included updates on the core priority areas, Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Disorder, Drugs & Alcohol, Reducing Reoffending and Serious Violence along with updates on Prevent, Public Engagement, Domestic Abuse Related Death Reviews, the Stay Safe Partnership, and finance.
- 4.4. The SLP Annual Report 2023-24 provides a summary of the SLP's achievements in relation to the priority areas during the last year and looks forward to the work planned over the next year. The full report and sub appendices are included in Appendix C, D ,E and F.

5. CCTV

- 5.1 An annual CCTV report for 2023-2024 can be found in Appendix D. The Report provides data from across the Partnership which includes the data for South Holland.

6. CONCLUSION

- 6.1. This report has outlined the work carried out by the county level Safer Lincolnshire Partnership and the local South and East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership. The report also provides enforcement data in respect of ASB in South holland.

EXPECTED BENEFITS TO THE PARTNERSHIP

The report provides an overview of the work undertaken to support the Council's statutory duty under s17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998. It supports an increased understanding and awareness of the partnership working taking place in the districts.

External funding has been granted through the government Safer Streets Fund which will support the Safer Streets and Safety Against Women and Girls priorities. Further funding opportunities will be sought wherever possible to support delivery of the Community Safety strategy. That aside, delivery will be managed through existing partner commitments and resources.

RISK MANAGEMENT

All risks will be managed as part of the strategy and action plan development as appropriate.

STAKEHOLDER / CONSULTATION / TIMESCALES

Consultation has been undertaken with the Portfolio Holders of each sovereign council and with key officers across the S&ELCP (Corporate Management and Service Managers).

REPUTATION

It is important that the councils demonstrate their commitment to dealing with community safety issues and responding to local concerns. The Community Safety Strategy will have a positive impact on the reputation of the S&ELCP as it shows our dedication to improving the safety and wellbeing of our local communities.

CRIME AND DISORDER

The Councils have a duty under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to take steps to reasonably prevent crime and disorder in the district. Changes to this legislation were brought in through the Police and Justice Act 2006, with subsequent regulations coming into force in 2007. The regulations set out the minimum requirements for partnership working to ensure effective practice and that all partnerships deliver to a common standard. This report evidenced compliance with the Acts and the regulations.

There are no direct implications from this report. It should be noted that CCTV surveillance techniques and investigations need to consider Article 8 of the Human Rights Act, which covers right to privacy. This is also subject to regulation under RIPA and CCTV Codes of Practice.
